
Broken finites completed infinites



### Words to Know

Finite verb: verbs that may be inflected for the person and number of the subject.

Non-finite verb: verbs which cannot be inflected for the person and number. Infinitive: in Dutch grammar, a non-finite verb form which is the dictionary form of the verb as well as the complement of auxillaries Auxiliary verb: In Dutch grammar, a finite verb which accompanies an infinitive to impart meaning to the infinite verb



#### Information

Dutch is a West Germanic language spoken mostly in The Netherlands and is closely related to standard German, English, and Afrikaans. Being closely related, Dutch shares many words and grammatical features with English, but is for the most part not mutually intelligible.

#### word formation

form either the infinitive or the finite verb based on the sentence

- 1 Hij nodigt jou uit.
- 2 Het schip zal veraf ondergaan
- 3 Jij dringt mij aan



### Answers

1 Yes, they are very distinct

2 the prefix on the infinitive moves to towards the end of the sentence 3 Yes, English verbs can have a similar separable verbs such as get up and go under, but the verb changes meaning entirely when the preposition is used as a prefix ie go under vs undergo
